These include such things as “Historical Questions”, “Promise of Technology”, and so on. Feel free to read these other sections as optional reading, as well as the other parts of each chapter that are not required reading.

Identifications: These are the people, events, dates, definitions, and so on that may be on the test. Remember that an identification is different than a definition.
